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Is water from boreholes safe to drink?

Dear Reader,
A UN summit was held in New York last month to assess the progress of the MDG's. According to a UNICEF/WHO report on water and sanitation the world will miss the sanitation target by half a billion people! On a recent visit to Malawi the charity Waterforall Africa carried out a water safety test on a 7 month old borehole installed in the centre of a village, probably by one of the well known international major charities. The water was found to be dangerous to drink. Pollution from nearby pit latrines and defecating animals drinking the spilt borehole water was sinking into the groundwater system contributing to this contamination. Contaminated water leads to diarrhoeal illnesses, and those unfortunate enough to have a reduced immune system through HIV/AIDS or Malaria are more likely to succumb to dehydration and die.

Health, sanitation and water are inextricably linked. If we can't deliver safe drinking water to rural communities extreme poverty will never be reduced. It is crucial the safety of groundwater used for drinking is tested on a regular basis.

Currently we are implementing a youth program called Amaranth production and processing a program funded by Kenya community development foundation- KCDF running from march-2010 to march 2011.we are training young people below 35 years in business plan creation, value chain, production, marketing, purchasing /procurement and value addition in Amaranth and other agricultural inputs/products. The project targets 100 young people in Kenya. We need this young people to become the producer, marketer and consumer of these local produced products to form young farmer's network around the world so that wealth created can revolve around young people. we also have water melon production a program funded by ministry of agriculture under NMK (njaa marufuku Kenya) meaning kick poverty out of Kenya in English.

There is also local vegetable production, for better nutrition, We train the community on traditional crops such as orphaned ones like Ground nuts, cassava, potatoes, millet, sorghum and many more. Local farmers need to be scholars while they farm. This orphan crop still hold key to poverty

alleviation in Africa where over 70% of farmers still depend on rainfall fed Agriculture, which is still not predictable. To mention drought, diseases and floods/erratic weather are yet another unsolved problem in Africa which affects African farming. Here people still depend on planting harvested and stored/preserved locally grains due to high cost of certified grains from agronomists taste and chemical contamination. Imagine a situation of GMO-genetically modified crops in the market more so Africa where most people/farmers can't afford farm inputs every year during planting season, because GMO you have to buy farm inputs every planting season which is not possible in Africa. We need to produce our own food due to 1.cost of production.2.chemical contamination 3.Taste. ■

A comparison of how Somali youth life varies from other youths in the world

Nowadays in the majority of developing societies, young people are benefiting from development through globalization and technological advancement. For example, young people are using new media and social networks to get hold of information and also make their voices heard. They can afford educational and job opportunities, social amenities. With new challenges and opportunities between generations, it is crucial that efforts are made to tone down the negative effects through intergenerational dialogues.

While Somali youth are one of the main victims of Somali conflict, they lost their destiny and objectives because they are not able to receive their basic needs. They are forgotten properties, assets and hopeless people. Unemployment, corruption, mismanagement, bribe taking and lack of health and social amenities made many young generation leave the country to go abroad in order to get education with high qualities and jobs with high salaries instead of humble jobs in their own country. Important job opportunities are limited.

To encourage intergenerational solidarity it's high time we young Somali youths volunteers organize or join an existing activity during the International Year of Youth with enjoyment and keep up momentum over the next 12 months with our friends and colleagues. Some of the activities we can embark on include: organizing community meetings or events and inviting local communities, supporting youth to engage in community service; organizing training seminars where youth can educate others on modern skills, such as new technologies and online tools.

Who cares the street children in Somalia after they became parentless? Everybody seems to agree that street children comprise a growing problem in Africa's cities. This is why most of us are interested in street children. This agreement is, however, very misleading. We know that planners do not plan for street children.

Wherever street children appear, they are not in the plans — and not wanted. But they are there through force of circumstances. It is no good deciding that we do not want them and trying to wish them out of existence. We need to decide where and how we do want them to live in a way that is practically possible. ■

The group is planning ways to establish concrete partnership with bigger human rights organizations, experts, lawyers, respective UN agencies and youth organizations worldwide to buttress international human rights documents as advocacy tools for human rights and peace building around the world. ■

Delivering a Better Future for Women and Girls

"Women who come to the health facilities have no sense they deserve decent medical care as a human right," said Keyani at the Women Deliver 2010 conference held in Washington, DC in June, where reducing maternal mortality was the focus.

Globally, we now have the largest generation of youth in history: more than 1.2 billion young people are between 10 and 19 years old. We are the future. Yet our future is uncertain if our health systems and health services continue to fail this generation, and the next.

It's an unfortunate truth that one woman, every minute, dies from complications due to pregnancy and childbirth around the world. This is also the leading cause of death for girls aged 15-19 in developing countries. Unplanned pregnancy rates continue to be high across the world, and of the 13% of maternal deaths worldwide due to unsafe abortions, almost half of those are aged under 19. The challenges of pregnancy and childbirth threaten young women's lives every single day.

Young people, particularly young women and adolescent girls, are disproportionately affected by a lack of access to affordable and safe health care services, comprehensive and evidence-based information and education, and a lack of autonomy in decision-making in their own lives. We also face especially serious barriers to accessing life-saving contraceptives and family planning services. Though, globally, we have seen a drop in total maternal deaths in the past ten years—progress we all should be proud of.

Fortunately, we can prevent these deaths if we invest in a few key safe and affordable health services. First, all women must have access to family planning so that they can determine whether and when they want to have children. They need access to skilled care before, during and after they give birth. Health providers must be trained in emergency obstetric care, and health centres and clinics must have surgical supplies for when complications occur. And all sexual and reproductive health services must be youth-friendly.

Providing these services are not only the right thing to do, it is the economically smart thing to do. Women and girls are a driving force in our economy, and when women are healthy, they play a crucial role in the development of our country. Young women, especially, have lifetimes of potential economic returns to give to their communities. Globally, maternal and infant deaths account for \$15 billion in lost productivity, not to mention immeasurable grief for families and communities. That is \$15 billion that could instead go towards strengthening economies, building roads and schools, and fostering a brighter future for our children.

As a young person, I attended the global conference on maternal health, Women Deliver, this past June in Washington, DC, the most important of its kind in the last ten years. Leaders, activists, and officials from around the world including Liberia Health Minister, Dr. Walter T. Gwenigale gathered together to call for increased commitments to women and girls. One such commitment came from Melinda Gates, who announced a commitment from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation of USD \$1.5 billion in new grant money for maternal health. Women Deliver representatives called on governments, multilateral organizations, and donors to redouble their commitments and translate the talk about maternal health into action. We must harness the momentum from the conference and take action.

Though the goals of the conference are global, the issue is local. It is about our mothers, our sisters, our wives, and our daughters. We all have a role to play: men as much as women; business as much as non-governmental organizations and the government; the young as much as the old. We—our president, our leaders, and ourselves—must all be part of this movement. No one can do it alone.

Now is the time to recognize the critical roles women and girls play in our country's future, roles they can fulfil



if—and only if—they can lead healthy lives. The benefits can last a lifetime and make a lifetime last. We know how to save the lives of women and girls in our country. Now is the time to do it.
